Hugh drew on past experience working nights to help him tackle seven nights of bridge in September, in a bid to qualify for the World Championships.

Hugh, who returned to Hamilton

earlier this year from the UK, is a core and long-time member of the Irish Open Bridge team.

31 European countries vied for the eight spots available during the week-long round-robin qualifying match, which for Hugh meant playing online from approximately 10.30pm to 5.30am each day.

Towards the end of Margaret's long career as a player and npc, she was still active competitively and socially (she had a set online game every Friday with David Hoffman against Julia Hoffman and Jodi Tutty).

Her last important title, the 2019 Women's Interstate was as a player, in partnership with one of Australia's finest players, Elizabeth Havas.

Elizabeth and Margaret, both Canberrans, have played together or been in the same teams for 30 or more years.


Elizabeth and Jodi Tutty (ACT Women's Team npc) played a troika with Margaret in the round robin of the 2019 Women's Interstate in Melbourne.

Elizabeth commented: "Margaret was quite ill in the lead up to the event, and not able to play on the first day. On the second day, her fierce desire to compete at any cost saw Tim Bourke collect her from hospital and take her straight to the venue. We had three double figure swings in our first match, and not only did ACT Women defeat WA comfortably in the final, but Margaret and I were clear total datum winners in the round robin."

Ed: "Margaret ended 2019 by competing in the 2020 Seniors' Playoffs in Canberra, in partnership with Peter Reynolds.

Her team had no trouble despatching my team, trouncing us by more than 60 IMPs. The hand above was one of Margaret and Peter's double figure swings. After Peter Reynolds opened 1¢, Margaret drove to slam after finding Reynolds had extra values.

West, on lead, had to find a spade to defeat the contract. When \heartsuit J was led at the two tables who essayed slam, the result was +1370, 12 IMPs to NS."

A brief but glorious partnership

"I barely knew Margi when she invited me to partner her on the famous Bourke team in 2006. I was an 'up and coming' player at the time, and remember not just the honour I felt, but also the pressure of being the 'junior' on the team. But Margi was an awesome partner, always understanding, collaborative, focussing on the next hand, the next match, the next opportunity.

Margi was not into complicated systems, that was only stuff you could forget, and she was not into heroics at the table either. Rehashing the type of hands you dine out on later, telling all your bridge mates with a big hoohah, was not her thing.

One of the big lessons I learned from her was that bridge is best when you are boring, playing straight down the line, all the time! Despite that, she was also pretty experienced and comfortable with being the catcher at the table, when partner did some wild pitching. This is something I believe was an established pattern between her and longtime former partner Lidia Beech.

2006 PABFC, Shanghai, Lathy Mil, Cathle Lachman, George Bilski, npc, Elizabeth Havas, Candice Ginsberg, Dagmar Neumann and Margi Unfortunately, I can't remember any hands from so long ago – but I do remember the funniest occurrence for me was when Margi and I sat down against Sabine Auken and Daniela von Arnim at the Fall Nationals in San Francisco.

We played two boards, BAM scoring, on which we won both. Not due to our accomplishments but to total disasters..

On one of the hands, Daniela opened I^{\heartsuit} , a transfer to spades. I had a good opening hand with five hearts. We had no agreement on how to show hearts, so I passed, waiting for the bidding to come back.

Sabine, with nothing, passed(!) and Margi, also with a decent hand and hearts, passed I♡ out. Daniela had opened on a nine-count if I remember correctly. I♡ went down a large number of tricks. Yet we won the board, because the pair at the other table bid to a heart slam, which was one down.

I loved playing with Margi – not only was she a great partner but also a fun friend away from the table. She demanded respect, not just because of

her accomplishments as a player, but also because of her warmth, her candour in speaking her mind without judgement, and with plenty of humour. Her matter of fact statements often had me in giggles. You always knew what she thought and that she cared.

When my personal circumstances forced me to make the decision to retire from bridge in 2008, the worst for me was the feeling that I was letting her down. And yet she was excited and pleased for me when I returned to the game a few months back. I will miss her!!"
